Honoring Christian Patriots

You might not be able to use the word "Christian" and "patriot" in many classrooms today. It's sad that our revisionist historians, who are re-writing our textbooks for the classroom, have decided to ignore the Christian roots for this great nation. Memorial Day reminds us to pause and reflect on our heritage. What is our heritage? Let me give you a few things to think about

First, ask yourself, what is Memorial Day? It is a holiday that was established in 1868 as a day to honor the fallen soldiers of the Civil War. Our president and Congress chose to set aside one day to dedicate in prayer, praising God for the sacrifice of the men and women who helped to purchase our freedom and remember their great legacy. Memorial Day has grown to become a solemn recognition of all of our nation's war dead and the high price of our freedoms.

Have you ever read The Gettysburg Address? I had to memorize it in school. It's very short, but it offers insight into President Abraham Lincoln's patriotic views, from a Christian perspective: "Fourscore and seven years ago our fathers brought forth on this continent a new nation, conceived in liberty and dedicated to the proposition that all men are created equal. Now we are engaged in a great civil war, testing whether that nation or nation so conceived and so dedicated can long endure. We are met on a great battlefield of that war. We have come to dedicate a portion of that field as a final resting-place for those who here gave their lives that that nation might live. It is altogether fitting and proper that we should do this. But in a larger sense, we cannot dedicate, we cannot consecrate, we cannot hallow this ground. The brave men, living and dead who struggled here have consecrated it far above our poor power to add or detract. The world will little note nor long remember what we say here, but it can never forget what they did here. It is for us the living rather to be dedicated here to the unfinished work which they who fought here have thus far so nobly advanced. It is rather for us to be here dedicated to the great task of remaining before us -- that from these honored dead we take increased devotion to that cause for which they gave the last full measure of devotion -- that we here highly resolve that these dead shall not have died in vain, that this nation under God shall have a new birth of freedom, and that government of the people, by the people, for the people shall not perish from the earth." (November 19, 1863)

Do you know what Chaplain Bennett said about General Stonewall Jackson after the Battle of the Cross? He said, "I saw something today which affected me more than anything I ever saw or read on religion. While the battle was raging and the bullets were flying, Jackson rode by, calm as if he was at home, but his head was raised toward heaven, and his lips were moving evidently in prayer."

This Memorial Day, let's praise God for those who have fought and died for us. And, let's especially praise God for those Christian patriots who believed in spiritual freedom! Have a great week!
